THE LEAST OF THESE

So what turned Bill Robinson’s search for a needed pastoral job into becoming the chaplain for the Ontario County Jail?

Hearing The Lord’s call on his heart while on the thruway near Syracuse, after visiting a friend in prison. The Lord said- “you need to see him as redeemable.” And so started Bill’s ministry journey.

After a conversation with David Sealy, the chaplain at the time, Bill “felt” that he was where he was called to be.

Bill has been given the gift to be able to enter the prison, and minister deeply and not be weighted down by what he hears and experiences. He can build relationships with prisoners, carrying their own weight of addiction, PTSD, homelessness and despair, and walk with them as equals. Bill can simply be “Bill” to each prisoner he comes in contact with.

Bill serves as the “Front Man” for many volunteers that come into the jail from both formal church outreaches and many who simply have a heart for those in prison. Prison is a place where every church is touched by a family member who is incarcerated.

So what is happening in the Ontario County Jail? Formal Bible studies on any given day, but more importantly, the prisoners minister to each other and hold each other accountable in their faith walks. Pod 7 is its own “Church” of caring men, who walk with each other as the Body of Christ and grow in their knowledge of the Lord through studying His Word.

Bill says to tell everyone- “Our county is incredibly blessed by the level of care and support—both within the system—from the Sheriff on down, and from without—by many caring volunteers.”

What are Bill’s dreams for the future?

He would like to see more churches and volunteers from the Geneva side of the county. He would like to see churches being intentionally welcoming to prisoners who have been released and are searching for a church family that is as supportive and rich in its involvement as the “Church Inside” is.

He says that letter writing seems to be such a simple gift, but that it can mean the world to a prisoner. He also wants to set

up an information booth in the lobby of the jail on visitation day, so that families can get information on any number of challenges. They may even be struggling to find out exactly where their loved one has been moved. Many prisoners are shuffled around the state, and the family does not get informed. Many other “Challenges” of the state system frustrate and overwhelm family members. Such an information service would be a wonderful gift. He would also like to set up a more formal network among the area’s county jail chaplains to support each other and share resources.

Bill is also very interested in exploring the “In Prison” ministry that Community Bible Study has established nationally. It might be an excellent partner.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S CHAIR

As we close out the year and head into a new year, I wanted to take the opportunity to thank all of our supporters, volunteers and member churches. Without your help we could not accomplish all that God has planned for us.

I would like to give you a snapshot of what we have been able to accomplish this past year. The CCIA food pantry served emergency food to over 5,000 families. This is an increase of 381 families from the prior year. The "Supply A Smile" Dental Clinic helped over 150 individuals with free dental care, and our one-day "Free Smiles" Dental Clinic helped 102 individuals with free dental care. The CCIA Mobile Food Pantry

served over 775 families with our one-day a month food distribution from June through October. CCIA working with the Canandaigua Primary-Elementary School helped to provide over 550 backpacks filled with different food items to help provide meals at home for our kids during the four long school breaks.

CCIA was able to establish a new outreach ministry here at 120 N. Main Street this fall. This new ministry in Room 27 is known as the "CCIA Resource Room". Those seeking help may be unaware of what services are available and where to obtain these services. Using our many emergency providers and

programs in our county we look to connect those in need with the different services that are available here to assist them. We continue to partner with Fidelis Care, NY Law, and Catholic Charities of the Finger Lakes. Together we have assisted over 1,500 individuals whether here at CCIA, or we were able to refer them elsewhere for help.

Again, thank you to all of those who have supported CCIA in many different ways throughout the year. Your kindness and generosity in giving and your love in serving as volunteers has touched many lives here in our local community and throughout Ontario County.

Millie loves what CCIA does in the Canandaigua area. She said, "It is a wonderful outreach to our community and it is expanding all the time to meet peoples' needs." Maybe it's a good thing for us that God didn't send Millie to Brazil—she and her family are loving assets to us right here.

HOW CAN I HELP?

There are many ways that you can help out. Have you ever considered doing a food drive? A food drive can be done in many places. You can hold a food drive in your community, workplace, school, or church. It is always good to get permission in advance. Some have used a birthday or anniversary as a great time to hold a food drive. Instead of receiving gifts they encourage their friends to bring items to donate to the food pantry. We can always use non-perishable food and personal care items. If you need a list of suggested donation items let us know at the food pantry. We would be glad to give you a list. Volunteers are always needed. Tuesday through Saturday the food pantry is

open. Our open hours run between 10 am – Noon and Noon – 2 pm. If you have a few hours to volunteer let us know by contacting Maggie Wiegand 394-3218 or Pastor Jeff Lippincott 394-7450.

Food deliveries come every two weeks on Mondays. Foodlink drops off 2-3 pallets of supplies. Our volunteers need to unload the pallets and using a cart will take the product down to the pantry for sorting and stocking shelves. We can always use some extra help. This does require some lifting, standing, bending and, at times, exposure to the outside elements. If you have some free time between 9 am and 11 am let Pastor Jeff 394-7450 know.

During the winter months consider doing a hat and glove drive. Like the food pantry this can be done in many places. These items are always in need during these cold months. We like to have an extra supply on hand to give out at the food pantry and Resource Room.

A great way to get your youth groups and children's church involved is making Birthday Bags. These are small gift type bags filled with some birthday items such as: cake mix, frosting, candles, and balloons. You can be creative and add more items if you choose.
